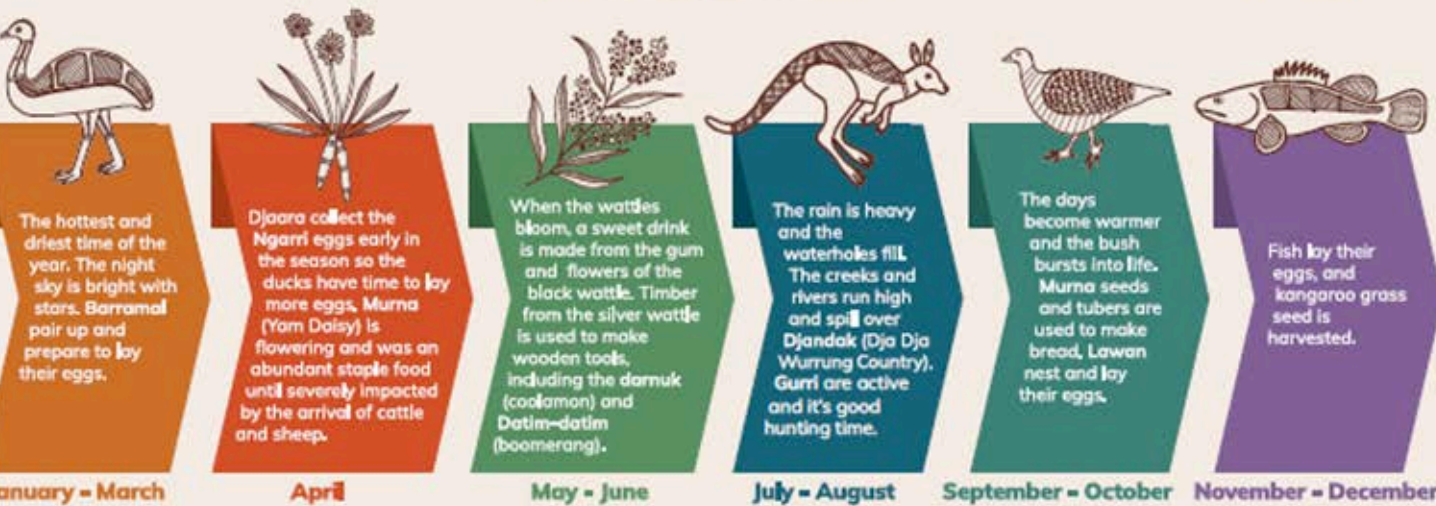
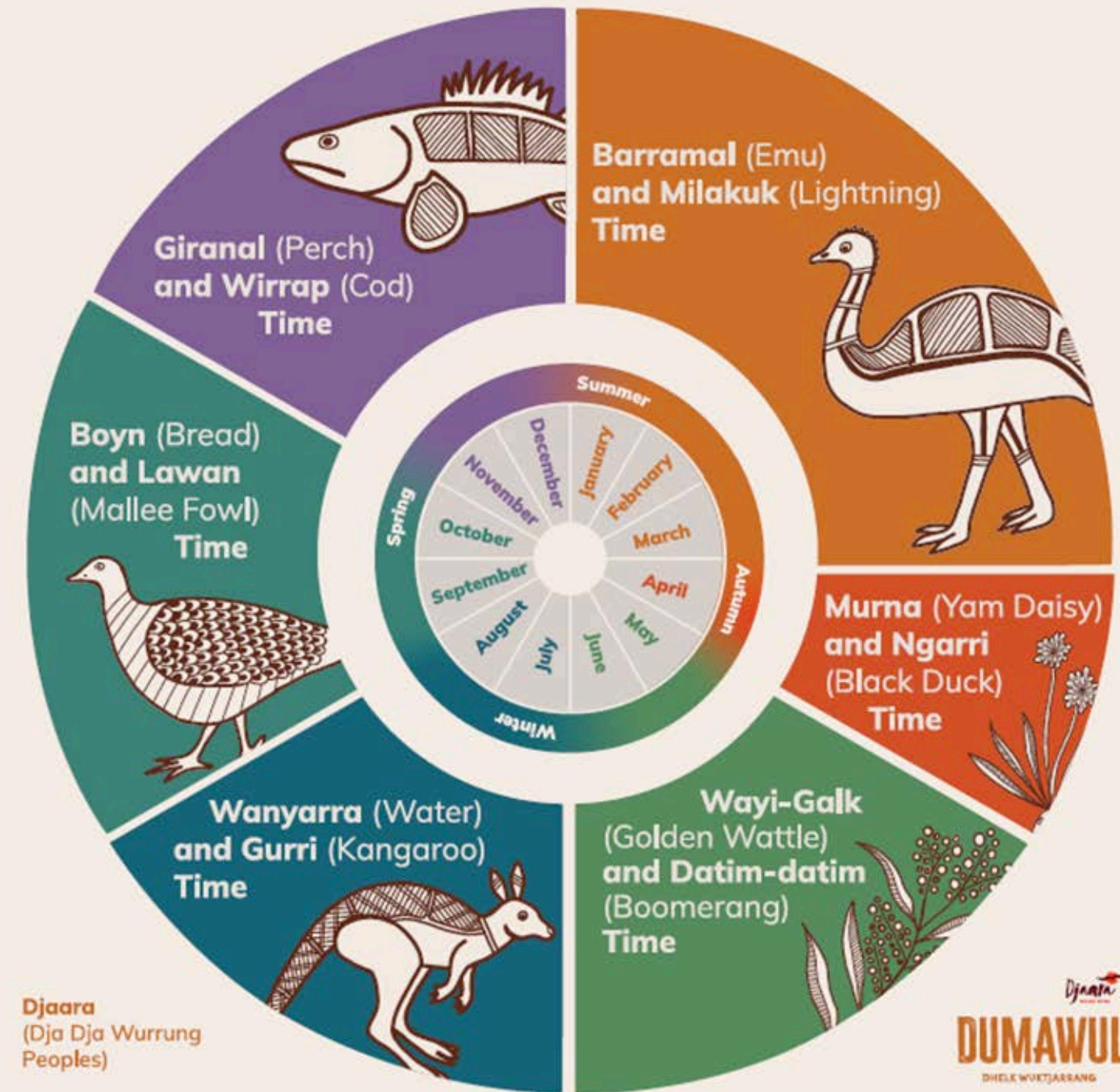


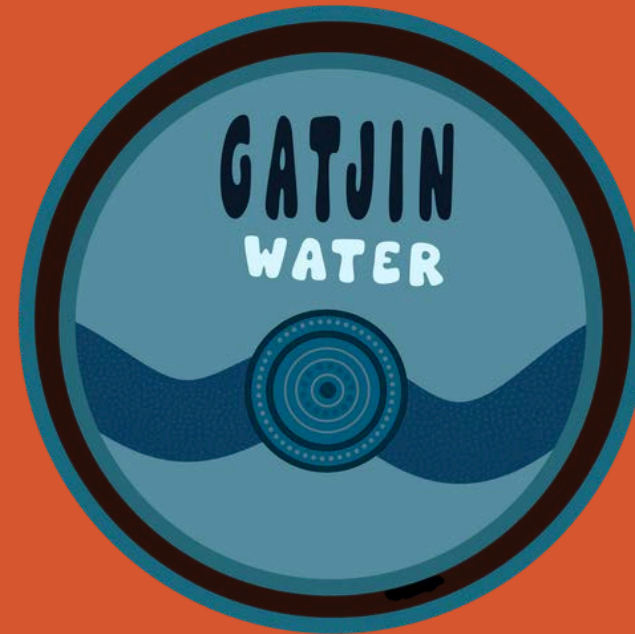
The Djaara Seasonal Calendar



Murna (Yam Daisy) & Ngarri (Black Duck) Season



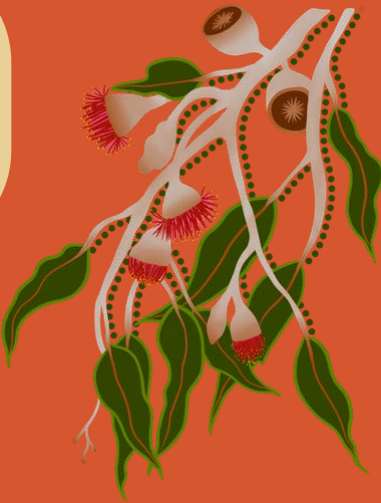
The first cool rains begin after the hot times and the land begins to rehydrate. **Ngarri** begin their courtship and nest making. **Murna** is flowering and the Rain Moths emerge from the ground. **Lawan** (Mallefowl) begin making their nests.

Gariyn (Bardi Grub) / Rain Moth



Introduction

Gariyn (Bardi Grubs) spend years underground as pupae before emerging as Rain Moths during the first cool rains after the hot times. They only live as a moth for 24 hours.

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Bardi Grubs are amazing bait for catching **Wirrap** (Murray Cod). They have been used by **Djaara** people for thousands of years. On **Djandak** you often find Bardi Grub holes near the **Biyal** (River Red Gums).

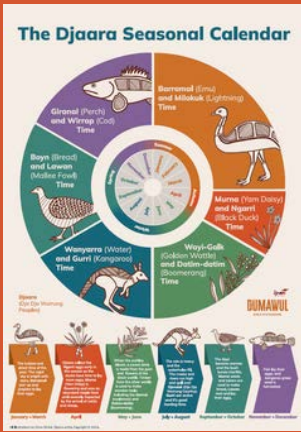


Rain Moths can be the same size as a small bird. They don't have a mouth, so they can't feed or drink. All they can do is mate and lay eggs. The female can lay over 40,000 of them!

Djali (Language)
The word '**Gariyn**' is actually used for anything small, white and edible, so it is also used for white termite and other grubs, rice and small eggs, even maggots!
The name 'Bardi' actually comes from the Noongar people in Western Australia

Both the pupae and the moth are an amazing food source. Many different species of fish, bats, birds and mammals rely on the yearly emergence of the moths to give them a big hit of nutrients. **Djaara** can also eat both the pupae and the moths for valuable protein.

We find a hole.

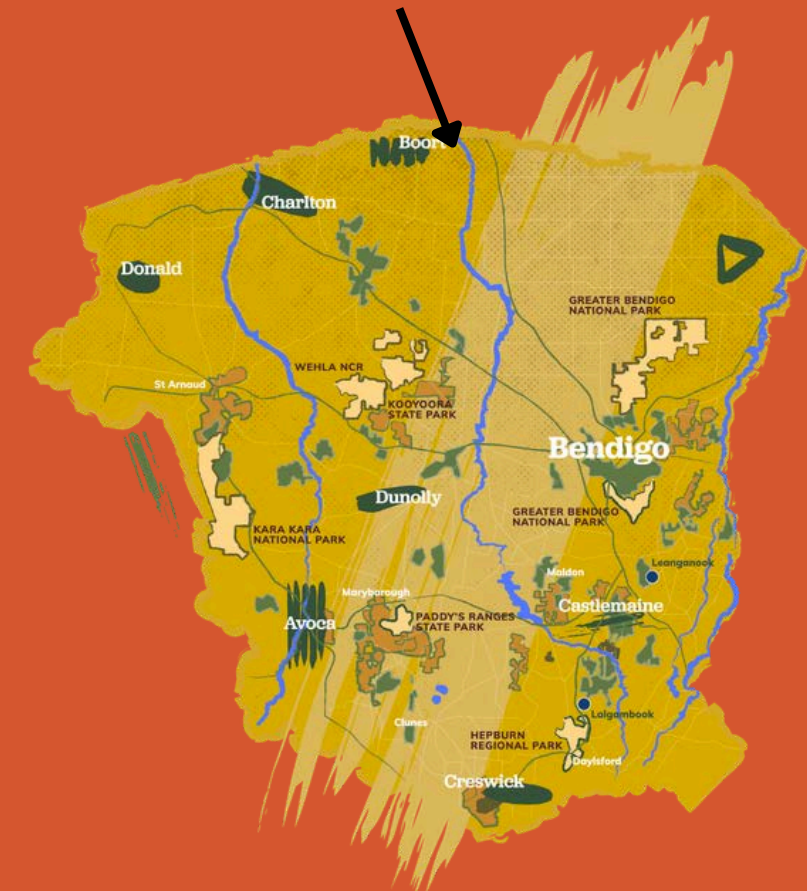
We tap the hole and listen.

A grub is in the hole.

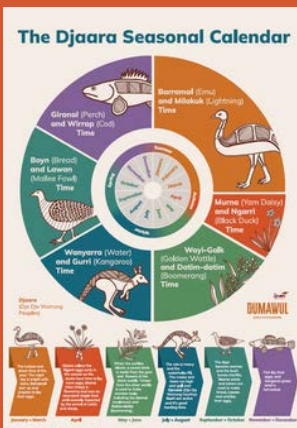
We use a hook to get the grub.

You can find Bardi Grubs all over Djandak, but Sharnni and her Pop like to find them near any big rivers, especially up the north of Djandak.

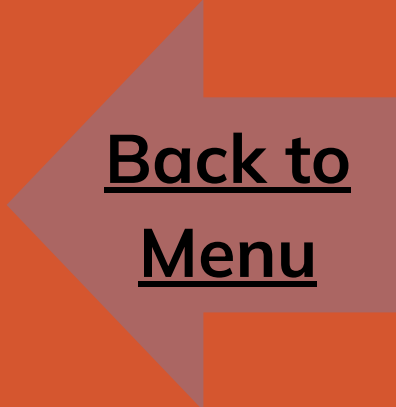

Pop and I go together to get Bardi Grubs. We need them to catch Big Cod in the river.

I love going on Country with Pop. He teaches me how to listen to Country, how to respect Country.

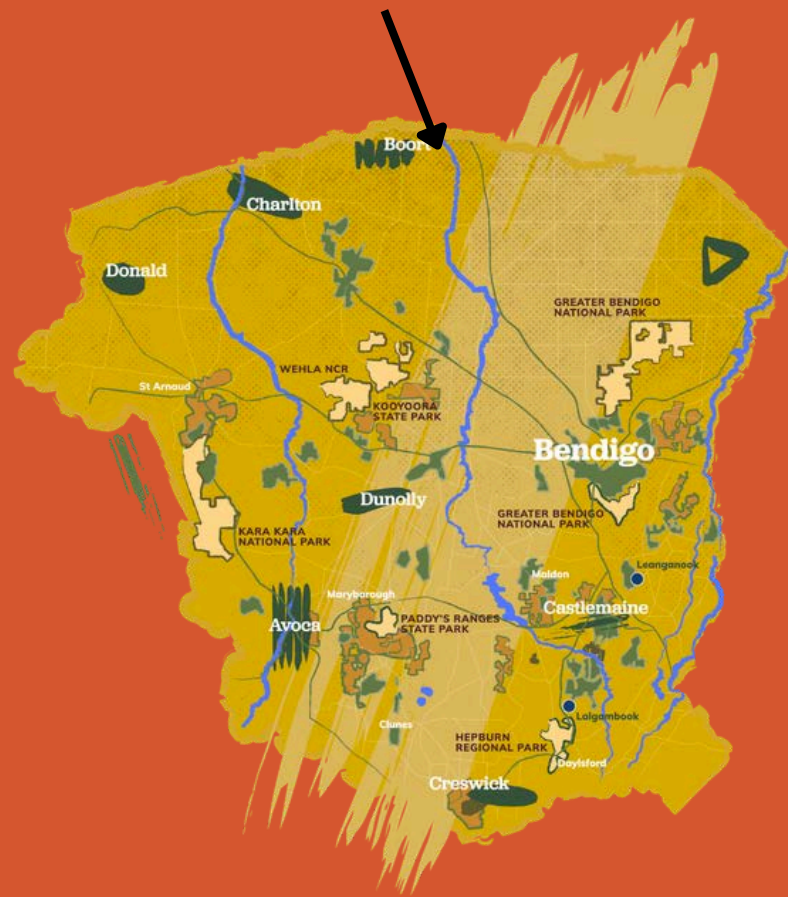
When we dig for baby grubs we have to be gentle. We just take what we need. This helps care for Country.

We look for holes near big trees. Pop can hear if a grub is inside by tapping the hole.

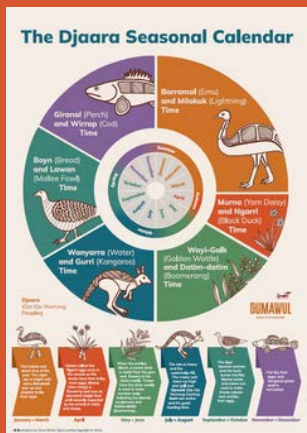
If one is inside, we use a hook to get the grub.

Some people like to eat the grubs. They are good for you. But we like to use them for catching Big Cod.

Dinner time!

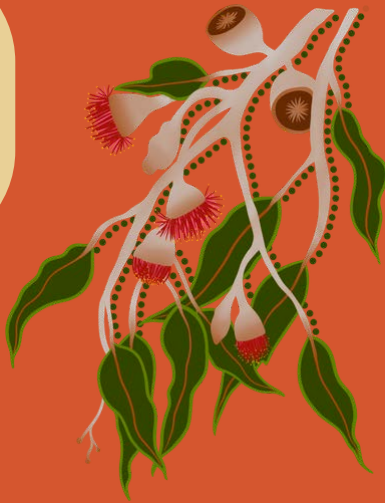

Bardi Grubbing



When I was young, I'd go out with my pop to gather Bardi grubs. Those trips were memorable. He didn't just show me what to do – he taught me how to listen to the land, respect it, and enjoy being out on Country.

When we dig for baby grubs, we have to be gentle. We don't want to damage the nest or harm anything living there. It's about taking only what we need and caring for the land while we do it.

We look for holes near big trees, and under grass. To check if a grub is still inside the hole, we gently tap the top. If it makes a soft thudding sound, the grub is probably still there.

We also look around the hole. If we see little hairs, it often means the grub has already changed into a moth. But if the area is clear, the grub might still be hiding inside.

If the grub is still inside, we get a stick or a cable with a spring at the end that we use as a hook. It pierces the end of the grub and we pull it out.

You can eat the grubs, they are very high in protein and are supposed to taste nutty. I just use them for fishing, to catch big Murray Cod.

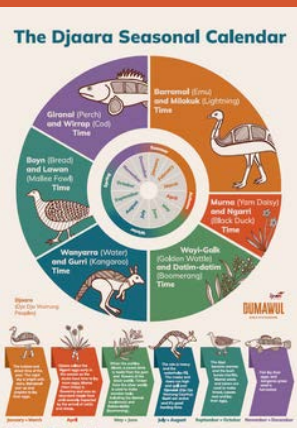
These moments with my pop taught me more than just how to find Bardi grubs.

They taught me patience, respect, and the importance of understanding the land – not just using it.

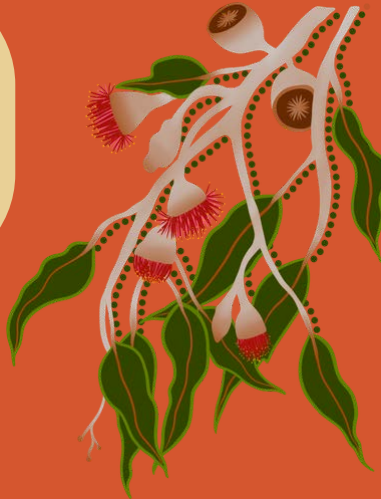

Maths

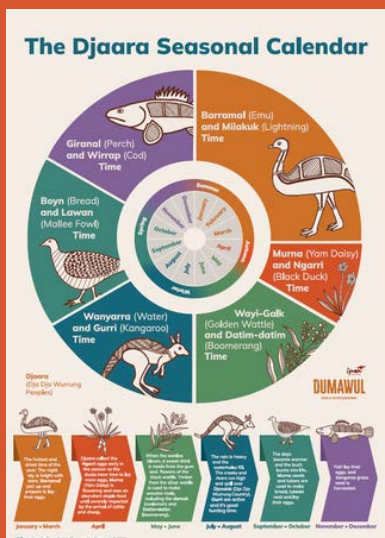
A Rain Moth can measure 12cm long and 16cm across. Make your own representation of the Rain Moth.

Look at the place of the **Gariyn** and Rain Moth in local food webs.

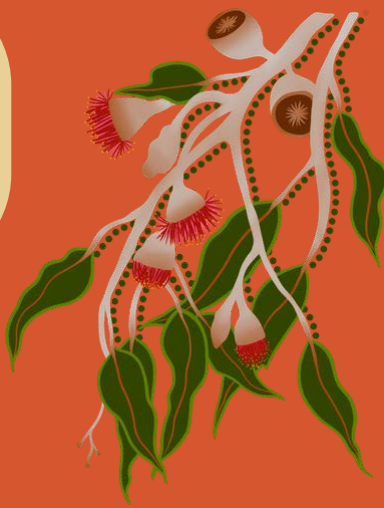
History

Is it legal for anyone to go and collect Bardi Grubs? Should/shouldnt it be?

History

Look at the impact colonisation has had on the gathering traditions of Traditional Owners

Writing
